Governor tours downtown, shares Smart Site news

Governor Martin O'Malley walked through downtown Cambridge June 28, checking on revitalization projects, attending a church service at historic Bethel AME on Pine Street, and announcing that Cambridge's Maple Street area is one of 15 new "Smart Sites" in Maryland—and the only one on the Eastern Shore.

Named after a program created by the state Department of Housing & Community Development, the Maple Street area covers key blocks of Gay, Muir, Pine, and High streets that are adjacent to the main downtown commercial corridor. The Smart Sites initiative will focus specially targeted state resources on capital projects that mix the concepts of Smart Growth and Green Growth, such as green building practices, energy efficiency projects, and the revitalization of older residential neighborhoods—especially ones near Main Street commercial corridors. The specifics of how

Smart Sites will work in Cambridge will be determined by city officials in the weeks and months ahead.

During his visit to Cambridge, the governor also joined in a tree planting at Waugh Chapel on High Street. As he walked through downtown, he chatted with residents and business owners, and even helped place a few pieces of mosaic on the new mural taking shape in Cannery Way on Race Street.


