Artist studios available in downtown buildings

Looking for affordable studio space to flex your creativity? With help from Cambridge Main Street, a new program is offering inexpensive studio space for artists in downtown buildings slated for redevelopment. These so-called "floating studios" offer unfinished spaces at about \$100 per month. The spaces are available on a temporary basis, perhaps 12 to 18 months, while buildings are awaiting complete overhauls.

For example, NOVO Development plans to redevelop the Marshy Hope building at 431 Race Street into residential and retail space. But the project won't be finished immediately, so in the meantime, space is available on the upper floors. While the space is not completely

finished, asbestos removal and rewiring has been completed.

These floating studios help artists who are looking for affordable spaces with good natural light—and bring life to buildings that would otherwise sit empty while awaiting development plans. While the idea has been successfully used in other cities, this is the first time it is happening on the Eastern Shore.

Artists interested in the floating studios can also register to be part of Cambridge's Arts & Entertainment District, which allows them to bypass state income taxes on the work they create and sell in the district.
