Clayton's Pharmacy to open Dec. 18

Downtown Cambridge's newest business, Clayton's Pharmacy, is slated to open Dec. 18 at 404 Washington Street, near the corner of Race Street. In addition to prescription medicine services, Clayton's will offer all manner of over-the-counter medicines and sports supplements, along with home health accessories such as walkers and wheelchairs. A native of Salisbury, owner Lisa Brooks now lives in East New Market. She has been thinking about opening her own pharmacy since earning her doctoral degree from the University of Maryland in 2005. Late this summer, she and her husband, Clay, bought the building that formerly housed the Rug and Antique Gallery.

DCA to fund restoration of Tubman mural

The Maryland State Arts Council recently awarded a \$4,750 grant to the Dorchester Center for the Arts (DCA) to fund the restoration of an outdoor mural in Cambridge's Harriet Tubman Memorial Garden that was defaced in August 2009. Charles Ross, an artist and direct descendent of Harriet Tubman, will restore the mural. His design plan has been approved by representatives of local government and the community. The project should be completed by July 2011. The memorial garden is located along Route 50 near Washington Street.

Why celebrate small businesses?

- For every \$100 spent at local small businesses, \$68 returns to the community.
- Over the past two decades, small businesses created 65 percent of net new jobs.
- Small businesses employ half of all private sector employees.
- Small businesses represent 99.7% of all employer firms.
