## Police stats show a safer downtown

With 2010 behind us, Cambridge Main Street asked the Police Department to review its numbers for major crimes in the downtown area. We're happy to report that the serious crimes tracked as "Part 1" offenses are down a strong 29.1 percent over the last two years downtown.

"This confirms the experience of so many people who work and relax downtown," said Jim Duffy of Cambridge Main Street. "Day in and day out, we see just how rare it is that there are any serious incidents."

Citywide statistics haven't been fully compiled for 2010 yet, but they showed a reduction of 27 percent in serious offenses in 2009 compared with 2008. Chief Malik reported that Part 1 offenses are at their lowest level in Cambridge since the mid-1970s. He also noted that in recent months the department has stepped up its focus on "quality of life" issues downtown, such as loitering and vagrancy offenses.

"We'd like to thank the chief and his officers for maintaining a strong, supportive presence downtown," said Duffy. "The work they're doing really helps create a climate that supports the revitalization of our downtown."

## Tax break updates

- The city's New Resident Senior Tax Credit is up and running. Open to individuals 60 and older who are moving into Cambridge from elsewhere, the program offers a 50 percent credit on annual property taxes for three years. Get more info at 410-228-4020.

- A new Tax Credit & Impact Fee Waiver kicks in when property owners complete at least \$50,000 in building improvements. Impact fees on such projects are waived, and owners received a graduated break over five years on paying taxes on increases in the assessed value resulting from the improvements.

Both programs were proposed in the city's Economic Development Strategic Plan.

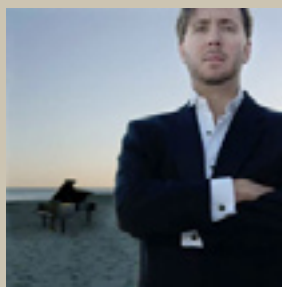
