Schooner Rendezvous Oct. 22-24

Nearly 20 schooners, tall ships, and other historic vessels will head to Cambridge for the fifth annual Cambridge Schooner Rendezvous Oct. 22-24—this year bigger than ever! While they're docked at Long Wharf, the ships will put out their gangplanks on Saturday and Sunday and invite the public aboard for tours and day sails.

So far, 10 schooners are expected, including *Pride of Baltimore II*, *Lady Maryland*, *Mystic Whaler*, *Farewell*, *Martha White*, *Heron*, *Prom Queen*, and *Celebration*.

While you're there, enjoy live music (including Slow Boat Captains for Truth and Justice, Janie Meneeley and Calico Jack, Schooner Time, Mid-Shore Community Band, Wheatstone Bridge, Mike Elzey Mayhem Band), food, and vendors. The action takes place on the banks of the Choptank River at Long Wharf Park, near the intersection of High and Water Streets.

In addition, tickets are on sale now for the Eastern Shore Dinner with Captains and Crew Saturday evening at the Cambridge Yacht Club. (\$35; buy online at www.richardsonmuseum.org)

Cambridge Main Street earns statewide award. Again!

Our volunteers are the best! More proof of that comes with the news that a multi-agency program of the state government has named Cambridge Main Street the winner of the 2010 Smart, Green & Growing Award for Community Activism and Achievement.



The judges concluded that our volunteers did an exemplary job of uniting our community behind the idea that a vibrant, revitalized downtown is critical to the future of Cambridge and Dorchester County. In doing so, we also encourage "efficient use of existing infrastructure and easing development

pressure on surrounding greenfields"—both hallmarks of the smart growth principles the Smart, Green & Growing initiative was created to advance.

This is the second statewide award our volunteers have picked up this year. In May, the Main Street Maryland award for exemplary performance in building a stronger organization went to the volunteers on what we call our O-Team, or Organization Team. City adopting new economic incentives

Attention, realtors and property owners! The City Council is ready to give final approval to incentives that aim to spur economic growth in Cambridge. The proposals, which come from a recent strategic plan put together for the City Economic Development office, had the support of Main Street, the Chamber of Commerce, and other groups.

- **The Downtown Development District tax credit** gives incentives for projects that significantly improve downtown properties. Developers will receive graduated breaks over four years on the extra taxes they'd owe once the building's assessed value increases. Impact fees on these projects will be waived as well.
- The so-called **Senior Tax Break** offers incentives designed to bring new residents to Cambridge, increasing the customer base for area businesses. Folks who are at least 60 years old and currently living elsewhere can receive a three-year break of 50 percent on their property taxes when they buy a home in the city and make it their principal residence.
