Feldman to head Main Street Board

The Main Street Board of Directors has nominated Philip Feldman to serve as president and Lois Colaprete to serve as vice president. Their candidacies for a one-year term will be presented to the organization's general membership for approval at an annual meeting on Monday, Sept. 20.

"What I love about the Main Street model is the way it is driven by citizens," said Feldman, Area Chairman of the insurance agency RPS ISG International. "It's all about neighbors stepping up and coming together to roll up their sleeves and make their town a better place. No sitting around waiting—let's get it done."

Feldman would succeed Chad Malkus, an attorney with Hodes, Pessin & Katz who served two terms as president.

A former director of research for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Colaprete has extensive experience in nonprofit administration and fundraising. She joined the board last year. As vice president, Colaprete would succeed William Jarmon after his two years of service. Main Street's membership will also be asked at the annual meeting to approve that Abby Messick continue serving as board secretary and Ted Brooks continue serving as board treasurer.

A first! Film Festival comes to downtown

Chesapeake Film Festival at Gallery 447 Sept. 25-26



Seven great films will be shown at Gallery 447 the weekend of Sept. 25 and 26 as downtown Cambridge for the first time becomes a screening location for the annual Chesapeake Film Festival. Festival screenings will also be held in Easton, St. Michaels, and Oxford.

"We're really proud to be a part of this great event," said Greg VandeVisser of Gallery 447. "The lineup of films the Festival brings to the Shore is really extraordinary."

Freedom Riders, a new documentary by acclaimed director Stanley Nelson about the brave souls who banded together in 1961 to defy segregation in the Deep South.

The Secret of Kells, an Academy Award nominee for Best Animated Feature that mixes adventure, action, and danger as a 12-year-old hero journeys through the Irish history as presented in the legendary "Book of Kells." (Suitable for ages 9 and up.)

Mars, a romantic comedy that unfolds in the form of a graphic novel as three astronauts embark on a manned space flight to the Red Planet.

Jean-Micheal Basquiat: The Radiant Child, a prize winner at the Sundance Film Festival that tells the story of the meteoric rise and fall in the 1980s of this African-American artist.




