Mural dedication Second Saturday, Oct. 10

The Cannery Way mural will be dedicated during a ceremony at 5pm, Second Saturday, Oct. 10. Cambridge Mayor Victoria Jackson-Stanley is expected to be on hand, as well as artists and volunteers who worked on the mural. Everyone is invited to the dedication to celebrate this wonderful addition to downtown. People from as far away as California, New Mexico, England, and Alaska have worked on the mural, as well as folks from surrounding states and counties, according to mosaic artist Jen Wagner, who helped spearhead the project more than a year ago. The mural is based on a design by artist Willy Schlossbach, who has a studio at 447 Studios & Gallery on Race Street. The mural, on the side of the Hunt Insurance Building at 436 Race Street, traces the heritage of Cambridge and surrounding areas, with the Choptank River serving as the unifying element. The river is created from mosaic.



A major public sculpture will be unveiled in the coming weeks to mark the city's 325th birthday. The sculpture was designed by artist Martin Hughes, a key member of the volunteer team running the Main Street Gallery. It is being fabricated by a team of employees at Cambridge International, the world's largest manufacturer of metal belt and wire cloth. The employees are donating their time to the project.

A final location for the piece has yet to be determined, but sneak previews of the project are planned for the Main Street Gallery during Second Saturday festivities on Nov. 14 and during a city 325th birthday bash at Sailwinds Park on Dec. 11. Twigs, bark, grasses transformed into works of art at Main Street Gallery

Artist Marcia Wolfson Ray transforms what others might toss on the yard waste pile into stunning works of art. She lives in South Dorchester County for the summer; Baltimore for the winter. Wherever she goes, from fields and marshes to vacant city lots, she's on the lookout for twigs, bark, seedpods, grasses, reeds, and plant stalks. She's inspired by the patterns and rhythms she finds in these natural "found objects."

She spends weeks on each sculpture, carefully preserving the pieces with a protective coating (which makes them surprisingly sturdy) and tying them together with string. The result is a beautiful work of shape, geometry, texture, and structure.

Wolfson Ray is just one of more than a dozen artists whose works are featured in this month's show at the Main Street Gallery, "The Shore: Line, Light & Color." You can meet some of the artists at a reception open to the public 5–8pm, Second Saturday, Oct. 10. The show runs through Nov. 7. The gallery is open Friday and Saturday, 11am–4pm.

Bike racks coming to downtown

Great news for those of you who like to get around by bicycle. Bike racks are coming to downtown! Five attractive bike racks will be installed in the coming weeks near Bella Luna, Avé Salon Studio, A Few of My Favorite Things, Jimmie & Sook's, and 450 Race Street. The bike racks came about when someone attending Taste of Cambridge saw the need—and gave an anonymous donation to the Choptank Heritage Trail group (Thanks to that anonymous donor!). "Providing



bike parking in our downtown shows that cyclists are welcome, and where we stop and store bikes is to be celebrated rather than hidden," said Brian Roche, a member of Main Street's Clean Safe & Green Committe. "The design fits well with the historic buildings downtown—the equivalent of a modern day 'hitching post' long ago when people rode horses."

25 trees to be planted downtown this month

This month, 25 trees will be planted downtown to provide more shade and complement the existing street trees. Funding comes through a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust Urban Greening Grant Program. The trees will all be native to Maryland, including dogwoods, redbuds, sycamore, oaks, maples, and tulip poplars. Planting days will be scheduled soon; check cambridgemainstreet.com for updates.
