Say goodbye to summer with a downtown block party. Stores will be open late. Race and Poplar Streets.

More streetscape improvements in the works

Look for more improvements in downtown Cambridge's streetscape this fall. This continues last year's work of installing historic streetlights, burying of electrical lines and adding brickwork on the sidewalks targeting Cannery Way, the 500 block of Poplar Street and the 400 block of Race Street. Now, the City of Cambridge has received a grant to extend the improvements to the 500 block of Race Street, from Muir Street to

Simmons Center Market. The grant comes through the Maryland Heritage Area Administration (MHAA) and is being matched locally by the city. These kind of facelifts can play an important role in spurring revitalization in downtown blocks. Work is expected to begin this fall, and Main Street is seeking additional funding to continue extending the improvements through more areas of downtown.
